How to enter and what to do

Please read this programme carefully. Make sure you know the numbers to enter, measurements, materials and details.

Decide which classes you would like to enter and fill out the entry form.

Take the entry form to Nunney Village Hall on Wednesday 1st September 2021 from 6.00pm to 8.00pm, where you can pay your entry fees to receive cards for your exhibits.

Alternatively, you can post your entry form and fees, and collect your entry cards from the Show Secretary at Nunney Village Hall on the morning of the show.

Postal entries must arrive no later than first post on Tuesday 31st August, and must be sent to:

All exhibits must have their entry card firmly attached, to avoid confusion.

In the children's classes the age of the child must be clearly marked on the entry card. **Please do not put the name of the child on the card or the exhibit.**

No entries will be accepted after 10:00am on the day of the show, with no exceptions!

The rules

- No exhibitor may enter more than one exhibit in each class.
- Garden exhibits must be grown by the exhibitor, except for section F.
- All exhibits must be the bona fide work of the exhibitor.
- No exhibits in sections H, I, J & K to have been previously shown at the Nunney Flower Show.
- All cut flowers must be shown in containers provided by the exhibitor.
- The committee will appoint competent judges whose **decisions will be final**.
- The committee reserves the right to decide any question not provided for in the rules.
- The committee will not be responsible for any loss or damage to persons or property.
- Special prizes may be awarded at the judges' discretion.
- All cups and trophies awarded at the judges'/committee's discretion.

Prizes and entry fees

Entry fees - 50p per entry [or 3 entries for £1]

Children's classes – free

Prizes - £2.00; £1.50; £1.00 [except where otherwise stated]

Children's prizes: £1.50; £1.00; 50p

Prize cards are awarded for 1st, 2nd and 3rd in each class

Rosettes will be awarded for outstanding exhibits in all sections

Section A: Vegetables

Judges' rules

- All produce should ideally be in pristine condition, unblemished, and unwashed (except for root vegetables) as far as possible.
- **Vegetables in the same class should be of the same variety and match as far as possible in size, colour, and shape, unless stated otherwise.**
- Cucumbers and courgettes should have the flower attached.
- Tomatoes should have their calyxes on.
- Rhubarb should be pulled, and have the leaves cut off to 3" [8cm] from the base of the leaf.

- A1. 5 Potatoes – white
- A2. 5 Potatoes – coloured
- A3. 3 carrots, of equal size – tops trimmed to 3" (8cm)
- A4. 3 onions, grown from set – tops trimmed to 3" (8cm)
- A5. 3 parsnips, tops trimmed to 3" (8cm)
- A6. 6 French beans
- A7. 3 beetroot - tops trimmed to 3" (8cm)
- A8. 6 runner beans
- A9. 2 cabbages
- A10. Collection of root vegetables – 3 kinds, 2 of each
- A11. 5 tomatoes with calyx
- A12. 9 cherry tomatoes with calyx
- A13. 2 cucumbers
- A14. 2 lettuces
- A15. 4 sticks of rhubarb
- A16. 3 leeks
- A17. 1 stem each of 5 different varieties of culinary herbs in a vase
- A18. 2 peppers
- A19. 2 marrows
- A20. Longest runner bean (1)
- A21. Novelty class – most unusual shaped vegetable
- A22. Collection of vegetables – 5 different varieties, 3 of each

Section A: Vegetables

- A23. Pair of any other vegetable not in previous classes
- A24. Collection in a basket – “A gift from the garden” – judged on the pleasure it would give the recipient. Max size 2ft.
- A25. Largest pumpkin

Prizes awarded

Pete Millard Memorial Cup awarded to the winner of class A10.

Vegetable Cup awarded to the winner of class A22. Cash prizes of £5, £3, and £2 for first, second, and third respectively.

Penny's Mill Cup awarded to the winner of class A24.

Shore Bowl awarded for the most points in section A.

Brown Cup awarded for the most points combined in sections A and C.

Cash prize of £2.00 to the winner of class A20.

Cash prize of £2.00 to the winner of class A21.

Section C: Fruit

Judges' advice

- All produce should ideally be in pristine condition, unblemished and unwashed as far as possible. **Do not polish**, natural 'bloom' should be retained.
- Fruit in the same class should be of the same variety and match as far as possible in size, colour, and shape, **unless stated otherwise**.
- All fruit should be ripe, with the exception of apples and pears, which may be shown in an unripe condition. Over-ripeness is a defect in any fruit.
- Stalks should be intact.

- C1. 4 dessert apples
- C2. 4 cooking apples
- C3. 4 pears
- C4. 6 plums
- C5. Plate of any soft fruit – 1 variety
- C6. Collection of fruit in a basket – 3 different varieties, 3 of each
- C7. Pair of any fruit not mentioned in previous classes

Prizes awarded

Pomeroy Salver awarded to the winner of class C6.

Shore Cup awarded for the most points in section C.

Brown Cup awarded for most points combined in sections A and C.

Section D: Flowers

Judges' advice

- Shape, thought, and effort are what the judges are looking for here. Plant material should be in pristine condition and should be in water-retaining material (eg foam, moss, etc), or in a vase with water.
- Large-headed flowers should be to the bottom, to provide focus to the exhibit.

- D1. 3 rose blooms, mixed OR single variety
- D2. 1 specimen rose with foliage (not open to winners of the Olszewski Cup within the last 3 years)
- D3. 1 specimen hydrangea head
- D4. 3 dahlia blooms
- D5. 3 crocosmia/montbretia blooms
- D6. 3 sunflowers
- D7. 1 spike gladioli
- D8. 6 fuchsia heads – to be shown on a board with water underneath
- D9. 6 stems of sweet peas
- D10. 5 stems of any flower not mentioned in previous classes. Either single variety OR mixed.

Prizes awarded

Olszewski Cup awarded to the best novice entrant in class D2.

Flower Cup awarded for the most points in section D.

Sally Berry Cup awarded for the most points in sections D, E, and F.

Section E: Pot plants

Judges' advice

- All pot plants must be owned by the exhibitor for at least three months prior to the show.
- Pots should be clean and undamaged.
- Where applicable, flowers should be plentiful and of good size.
- If plants are of equal merit, the plant which takes the most skill to cultivate will be given preference.

- E1. Pot plant, foliage only – max 14" (36cm) pot
- E2. Pot plant, flowering – max 14" (36cm) pot
- E3. Cactus in a pot
- E4. Succulent in a pot

James Evers Trophy awarded for the most points in section E.

Sally Berry Cup awarded for the most points in sections D, E, and F.

Section F: Floral arrangements

Judges' advice

- Shape, thought, and effort are what the judges are looking for here. Plant material should be in pristine condition and should be in water-retaining material (eg foam, moss, etc), or in a vase with water.
- Large-headed flowers should be to the bottom, to provide focus to the exhibit.
- Buttonholes or corsages should not be wrapped in foil as this leads the eye away from the display. The exhibit should be tied and displayed in a container, to prop it up.

- F1. Arrangement of mixed garden flowers and foliage, any container – max 24" (61cm)
- F2. Miniature arrangement – max 4"x4" (10cm x 10cm)
- F3. Arrangement in a model vehicle – men only
- F4. Arrangement in a single colour – max 24" (61cm)
- F5. Arrangement of **wildflowers** in a posy – max 8" (20cm)
- F6. Arrangement of dried flowers and seed heads – max 24" (61cm)
- F7. Buttonhole or corsage

Prizes awarded

Upsall Cup awarded for most points in section F.

Sally Berry Cup awarded for the most points in sections D, E, and F.

Section H: Handicraft

Judges' advice

- Design and use of colour are what the judges are looking for here. The item must be fit for purpose, easy to use, and pleasing to look at.
- Aspects to be considered: shape, scale, balance, space, colour, texture, proportion, form, variety, harmony.
- Cross stitch and embroidered items may be framed.

- H1. Hand-knitted item
- H2. Crocheted item
- H3. An item in cross stitch
- H4. Hand-knitted OR crocheted item by an exhibitor aged 70 years or over
- H5. Pottery item
- H6. Hand-made jewellery – any medium
- H7. Machine-sewn garment – usual hand finishes
- H8. Cushion cover (with pad) in any medium
- H9. Something new from something old (describe the original item, this may include a photograph)
- H10. A hand-made wooden item – max size 24" x 24" [60cm x 60cm]
- H11. A hand-made lavender bag
- H12. Soft toy – any medium
- H13. An article in any medium NOT mentioned in previous classes.

Handicrafts Cup awarded for the most points in section H.

Section I: Painting and drawing

Judges' advice

- The judge will be looking for good use of colour, perspective, balance and composition, tonal value, and good use of materials.
- No art is to be digital apart from class 105.

- I1. A drawing in charcoal or pastel – any subject
- I2. A water colour – a Nunney view or scene
- I3. A botanical picture on a postcard – not to exceed 6" x 4" [15cm x 10cm] – any medium
- I4. Digital artwork – any subject

The Visit Nunney Cup awarded to the winner of class I2.

Yeoman Cup awarded for the most points in section I.

Section J: Photography

Judges' advice

- The judge will be looking for good use of colour, perspective, balance and composition, and tonal value.
- All photographs are displayed on large boards – please enter them unframed.

- J1. Snapshot with comic caption – 7" x 5" or smaller
- J2. Pets – a colour photograph – 7" x 5" or smaller
- J3. Collection of 4 colour photographs – 7" x 5" or smaller, any subject
- J4. Architecture – a photograph 7" x 5" or smaller
- J5. Lockdown-themed photograph – 7" x 5" or smaller
- J6. Wildlife-themed photograph – 7" x 5" or smaller

Prizes awarded

Olszewski Bowl awarded for the most points in section J.

Cash prize of £5 to the winner of class J3.

Section K: Creative writing

- K1. An original limerick on the Olympics
- K2. Haiku on the subject of freedom
- K3. Ghost story of 500 words or less
- K4. A poem in iambic pentameter on the theme of 'tomorrow'

Prizes awarded

Colin Cross Memorial Tankard awarded for the most points in section K.

Section L: Children's classes

Judges' advice

- All exhibits must be the child's own unaided work, with the exception of supervision when baking or using tools due to health and safety.
- The age ranges refer to the child's age on the day of the show, and should be clearly marked on their entry card.
- **DO NOT PUT YOUR NAME ON YOUR WORK PLEASE.** All judging is done anonymously to make it fair.

All ages:

- L1. A miniature garden, any medium (except plasticine, clay, or dough) max 30cm
- L2. A Lego building with a base no larger than a piece of A4 paper
- L3. A hand-sewn item (no glue please!)
- L4. Animal made from fruit and/or vegetables (cocktail sticks may be useful here)

Ages 3 and under:

- L5. A potato-stamp printing
- L6. A model in plasticine, clay, or dough
- L7. A paper plate face

Ages 4-7 years:

- L8. A hand-written copy of *Mrs Moon* by Roger McGough, to be judged on handwriting and illustrations
- L9. A flower collage
- L10. 5 radishes grown from seed

Ages 8-11 years

- L11. A hand-written copy of *The Squirdle* by Spike Milligan, to be judged on handwriting and illustrations
- L12. 2 varieties of lettuce grown from seed
- L13. A hand-made puppet

Section L: Children's classes

Ages 12-15 years

- L14. 3 vegetables of one variety, grown from seed
- L15. A hand-drawn cartoon strip
- L16. A hand-made mobile phone case/cover
